Since childhood, Adriana Marais has dreamed of living on another planet. This dream is close to being realised, as she is one of the 100 Mars One Project astronaut

candidates in the running to move to the Red Planet in 2026.

"I hope one day to continue my research on Mars, and possibly even contribute to the discovery of evidence that life once existed there," says Marais of her plans.

"I believe that education comes with the responsibility to share knowledge, and while still on Earth, I am actively involved in the promotion of science and space exploration as Special Project Coordinator for the Foundation for Space Development South Africa, an exciting initiative of which is the Africa2Moon project."

According to Marais, we are living in a unique point in the world's history, having reached a time where our activities are having an effect on a global scale, and food, clean water, and fresh air are fast becoming luxuries to which not all of us have access. "In order to sustain our existence on this planet and perhaps others, each one of us needs think carefully about how we can contribute to the solution of the many problems and global issues that exist today."

She continues, "We need to remember what it is that makes us human: to question, to dream, and to try to make the world better."

Marais is not immune to doubting herself: "I don't allow myself to dwell on these thoughts. At the end of the day, persistence and belief in yourself and your visions of the future are the tools with which you can succeed."
